Bus and Walking Tour
Sunday, March 17, 1:00-4:30

A bus will take the Sunday tour participants to walking tours of three campuses/complexes in the Washington area.

Gallaudet University, laid out in 1865-66 by Frederick Law Olmsted and Calvert Vaux with buildings designed by Frederick Withers and others, is the nation's premier educational institution for the deaf. Our tour will consider the particular appropriateness of these Victorian Gothic buildings as spaces for the deaf.

At **McMillan Reservoir**, a significant distribution point for the city's water that went into operation in 1905, we will examine the system of underground sand filtration compartments in the portion of the grounds operated by the Army Corps of Engineers.

Finally, the **National Park Seminary in Forest Glen, Maryland**, consists of more than a dozen whimsical buildings constructed between 1887 and 1928 for a resort that became a girls' school and later a military facility. In the past decade this idiosyncratic collection of buildings in a pastoral setting has been renovated to serve as the core of a larger housing complex; we will look at the relationship between the historic campus and present complex.
